How many different types of leaves can you find?

- Collect leaves you find on the ground from a variety of plants and/or trees
- Place them in a circle and talk about how they are similar and how they are different
- Arrange then in a line based on size
- Rearrange them using a different pattern
- Have each person select their favorite leaf and share why they like it the best



What do you hear?

- Spend at least 5 minutes listening to the sounds around you
- Count by putting up your fingers, the number of different sounds you hear
- Share with your family members-Did you hear more nature sounds or human sounds? How were they different?

What was a sound you found pleasing?

What was a sound you found not so pleasing and why?

How might the sounds you heard be different at a different time of day?



Get to Know a Tree

 Find a tree and spend time getting to know it

What do you notice about the bark? Can you put your arms around it? How would you describe the leaves to someone?

Can you find signs of living things on it (moss, insects, birds...)?

Does the tree and/or its leaves have a smell?

What features do you like best about this tree and why?



What Is It Like to be an Insect?

Find an insect to watch (ant, bee, spider, rolly polly, etc.)
Look at its body shape
What color is it?
Notice how it moves
What is it doing?
Where is it going?
What do you think it eats?

Who do you think might eat it? If you could interview this insect, what questions would you ask it?











Find 2 Different Flowers Compare them by:

- Color
- Number of petals
- Petal shape
- Center part of flower
- Smell
- Overall shape of the flower
- Are your flowers more similar or different from one another?
- What wonderings do you have?
- Which flower do you like best and why?



Go on a Scavenger Hunt Can you find:

- A feather
- Something round
- A chewed leaf
- A perfectly straight stick
- A hole
- One camouflaged animal/insect
- Something that makes noise
- A pollinator on a flower
- A bird's nest
- A spider web
- Human litter
- Something you hadn't noticed before



Make a Pattern

- Find several different items in nature
- Arrange them in a pattern Example:
 - leaf, rock, feather, rock and repeat
- How could you make a new pattern with these items?
- How could you change the shape of your pattern?
- Have different people in your group add items
- Please put these items back where you found them when finished



Take Time in Nature Find a place to sit quietly and share:

- What do you see?
- How many living things?
- How many nonliving things?
- What do you hear?
- What are the natural sounds?
- What are the people noises?
- What do you smell?
- What do you feel?
- What is something you hadn't seen or heard before?
- How does it feel to just be still for a while?











Can You Move Like a.....

- Bee
- Snake
- Rabbit
- Hawk
- Grasshopper
- Worm
- Coyote
- Lizard
- Duck
- Tortoise
- Come up with your own animals
- Have different family members take turns calling out an animal



Be a Nature Detective

- Look for signs that animals have been where you are-Examples:
 - Scat (mammal poop)
 - Feathers
 - Animal path in bushes
 - A hole
 - Bird poop
 - Spider web
 - Tracks
 - Leaf with holes
 - What other signs did you Find?



Guess My Nature Treasure

- Have each person in your group find a nature item on the ground - a nature treasure, but don't let anyone else see it
- Observe your nature treasure carefully (color, shape, feel, size..)
- Take turns giving one clue at a time for others to try to guess what your treasure is
- Once the treasure is guessed, or revealed, share why you picked this treasure up
- When finished, put your treasures back in nature



Go For A Walk and Talk

- Go for a walk on a path or trail
- Stop often to observe the nature from that spot (you could take turns deciding where to stop)
- Talk about what you see, hear, feel, and/or smell (be sure to look at the ground, at eye level, and above)
- Repeat this at different times throughout your walk
- Which was the most interesting spot you stopped at? Why?
